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## **5 tips** to keep your family safe online



Parents and carers can use a combination of strategies to help young people build their digital technology skills and have safer experiences online.

#### 1. Start the chat

Get into the habit of talking about online safety as a family, so your child feels comfortable coming to you if they ever need help working out an issue. It's never too early to introduce **good online habits** such as respect, empathy, critical thinking, responsible behaviour and resilience. As your child grows older, eSafety's advice about **hard to have conversations** will help with some of the tricky topics like sending nudes, online pornography and contact from sexual predators.

### 2. Create a family technology agreement

Creating a Family Technology Agreement can help you and your kids decide together when and how digital technology will be used at home. As a family, brainstorm easy-to-follow rules and display them where everyone will see them. Your agreement could cover things like: time limits, apps your kids are allowed to use and online behaviour. Families with younger children can download a template to guide the conversation.

#### 3. Set up parental controls

Parental controls let you monitor and limit what your child sees and does online. It's best to use them in combination with the other online safety strategies listed here. Taming the technology can help you understand your options. Grab a device and get started with our guides to setting up parental controls on devices and accounts or in social media, games and apps.

### 4. Choose games and other apps carefully

Use eSafety's <u>App checklist for parents</u> to think about the positives and negatives when your child asks to download a new game or other app. The checklist covers things like age ratings, managing privacy settings and reporting abuse in-app. You can also use <u>The eSafety guide</u> to check and set up safety features with your child.

### 5. Use digital technology together

Exploring or playing on devices or online with your child can be a positive experience that promotes learning and development. Ask questions, be curious and get involved. ### **Preps**

### Literacy

In Reading, we are really seeing positive growth for all of our students. It is so exciting to note how far our they have come since the beginning of the year. Just a reminder to all of the importance of reading at home on a consistent basis as this helps further develop a child's reading skills.

In Writing, our students have continued to learn the process of Planning, Composing and Recording. We are seeing some wonderful results here as students are now beginning to write with a better understanding of how to plan and structure their writing piece, and also how to check it and then make appropriate changes for improvement. Well done to all of our Preps for their awesome work here!





#### Numeracy

In Numeracy, the children have been consolidating their understanding of Number and Place Value. They have been focusing on reading numbers, writing numbers and understanding the value of a given number. They will now revise number operations and strategies used to solve worded problems for Addition, Subtraction, Multiplication and Sharing.



In Religion, the children have been learning about ways we can live like Jesus. They have been exploring how we can care for ourselves and others and sharing ways in which they can be kind to people just as Jesus showed us.









### Inquiry

In Inquiry, the students will be focusing on Australian Animals. Our students will be challenged with the task of learning as much as they can about Australian Animals including their features, characteristics, habitats, food, etc. It is an exciting topic for our students, and please feel free to ask them questions about their knowledge of Australian Animals.

#### Literacy

We have been looking at Letter Writing and comparing the different kinds of audiences and adjusting the language used. For example, if we write to the Editor we use persuasive language and if we write a Thank you letter we use grateful and friendly language. We have been doing PATR testing in Numeracy and Reading. The results will inform us of where your child's strengths are in these areas as well as the areas we can build on.



### **Nightly Reading Hints**

We ask that all students please read to an adult every night. Once completed please write the title and a small comment in their reader diary. Students will also be required to read every morning when they arrive at school before they go outside to play.

When reading at home together, before reading, predict the story, look through the illustrations using the language in the book, stop half way and share what you think might happen next, check your predictions at the end. Finally ask your child to retell the story checking comprehension.

### **SMART Spelling**

We are finding that many children are not completing their Spelling homework. We are only asking for children to do 2 nights a week. We check on Fridays. We congratulate those children who regularly complete their work. We continue to challenge all children.



### **Numeracy**

In Numeracy, we have been focusing on measurement. We have been looking at the different types of measurement, both informal and formal. The children have been working out the perimeter of shapes as well as the area. We are also focusing on capacity and hefting. This is an exciting topic and we are having lots of fun learning how to measure different things. Along with this topic we are continuing to do place value and counting daily. Skip counting is a really important part of Maths and we would encourage you to practice this at home with your child.





### **Religion**

In Religion, we are looking at change in our lives and how it can help us grow. We have discussed the life of Jesus and compared it to our life today.



### **Inquiry** -

This term our Inquiry unit is 'Through Generations'. We will be exploring how our community, families, toys, clothes and more have changed over time. Students have so far enjoyed seeing how toys differ from the ones they know and love today. It would be wonderful if you could talk about things that are different from your childhood to now. We look forward to hearing what students find out.

### **Inquiry**

Our Inquiry theme is exploring World Cultures.

We are exploring the continents, countries, landmarks, people, customs and traditions of many places around our world. The children have really enjoyed researching, wondering and discussing the new and exciting information they find! It is such an inquisitive area, where the "wonderings" of the students are only limited to their imagination!!

### **Literacy**

We continue using our Inquiry theme within our Reading and Writing. Exposing students to texts that are influenced by other cultures of the world.

In unpacking texts such as; Brothers Grimm Fairy Tales, Aesop's Fables and The Three Musketeers. We have explored how different cultures influence setting, character, timeline of events, factual historical significance and the way the story is told. We use our whole school "Writing Process" to guide our work in writing, allowing for structured learning experiences. Other specific areas we have focused on are handwriting, grammar, punctuation and building vocabulary.

#### Morphology


An area within Literacy we have focused on this semester has been Morphology. This is the study of words and their parts. We have concentrated on unpacking prefixes and suffixes. Students have explored the meaning of different suffixes and prefixes and what adding them to a word does for the meaning of it.

Children work in teams each Tuesday to build vocabulary based on a particular prefix or suffix. They put these words in sentences, explain tense, discover if it is a "free" or "bound" word, discuss morphemes and phonemes and use the words in context in their writing and conversations.

### **Numeracy**

This week we will move to a new focus in Measurement, which is "Location".





This is an opportunity to learn through hands-on tasks such as doing, making and exploring concepts such as maps, area, symmetry, the environment and position.

Real life connections and experiences enable us to learn on a deeper level and this is where we will explore with the students.

We continue to consolidate our core numeracy knowledge, skills and strategies. This is focused on identifying numbers, ordering / rearranging numbers to make them bigger or smaller, place value, number patterns, addition and subtraction strategies.

We focus on multiplication facts and quench our competitive thirst through "Shoot- Out"!!

This is part of our daily maths routine.

Our focus in Maths has been on Whole Number, Addition and Subtraction. These make up core areas of numeracy and are so important to understanding other areas of maths. Consolidating effective strategies for addition and subtraction is major focus.





