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## Preps

As Semester One comes to a close, it is hard to believe that our children have completed half of their first year at school. They have had an amazing term of learning and we have seen so much growth and development.

### <u>Literacy</u>

In Reading, students have been continuing their Sounds-Write work and teacher led tasks. Our Prep students have also been focusing upon the importance of sounding out tricky words, but not sounding out words they already know with the goal of improving reading fluency. As always, it is very important that the children practice their reading at home each day to consolidate what they are learning at school and that they are getting their diaries signed.

In Writing, students have been learning about how to create sentences with appropriate punctuation. They have been encouraged to apply their letter/sound knowledge to sound out unknown words, to write common words and reread their writing for meaning. They have also been working on correct letter formation, pencil grip and posture. We have been seeing some excellent results in writing this term!



### Numeracy

In Numeracy, students have continued their daily counting to 100 or higher and skip counting by 10's, 5's and 2's. They have been matching the number name, numeral and collection of objects. They have been using concrete materials to solve addition, subtraction and sharing problems. Next week, the students will begin to learn about Money. They will explore what money is, what we use it for and what the value of different coins and notes are. If you have any special coins or money from different countries that you would like to send along, it would be great to be able to share and talk about this.

### **Religion**

In Religion, students have been focusing on the unit 'God knows us and loves us. Students have been exploring the ways in which God loves us and understanding that God's love can be revealed through our families, friends and creation.

### <u>Inquiry</u>

In Inquiry, students have continued their learning around 'Special Places'. They have been exploring special places within Australia and learning why these places are important. Students have also been looking at maps, investigating why we use them, how we use them and what information they show us.

### Juniors

As we reach the end of Term 2 we would like to congratulate you all. Your children have done a fantastic job this semester and we are all proud of their achievements. We ask that even though we are nearing the end of the term please continue your nightly reading.

### Fruit Break

To make our 10am fruit break easier for the children and teachers, we are asking that fruit for this be packed separately from the rest of the lunch box. This will enable children to put their fruit on their table in the morning and cause less of a distraction during our morning session. If you have any questions

or concerns about this, please feel free to contact your child's teacher.

### Literacv

Connecting to our theme 'Worldly Wonders', students have finished writing narratives about traveling to a place in Australia. We were able to use our iPads to research Australia and places we would like to visit. This gave us great vocabulary and a clear picture of where we were going and what we would be able to do.

We are now turning our focus to information reports for reading and writing. Over the coming weeks we will investigate an Australian animal and write our own information report. If you have any information books at home, feel free to explore them with your child and bring them for





Show and Tell. We would love to hear any fun facts you have found.

### Numeracy

We have completed our topic on Multiplication and we are moving onto Chance and Data. During this topic the children will explore how to collect data and represent it on a chart or table. The children will be asked to interpret charts and investigate the likelihood of different events occurring. This is a fun topic and a nice way to end our term.









### **Religion**

In Religion we are continuing to explore the Church and how Baptism welcomes us into the Church community. In the coming weeks we will explore how Jesus was baptised and how we are called to live like Jesus and show God's love for all, through the things we say and do. We have started exploring the idea of belonging and how you are initiated into new groups (school, football/netball clubs, scouts, etc).

### <u>Inquiry</u>

Our theme 'Worldly Wonders' fitted perfectly into National Sorry Day and Reconciliation Week. Students have explored Australia and our First Nations Peoples.

### **Homework**

Students continue to receive weekly decodable readers to reinforce their sound focus from the current and past week. We encourage students to explore other texts with support. Weekly words are stuck into their phonics book in their reader folders and we ask that your child practices writing these words at least twice a week. We are noticing a fair number of students don't have their diary filled out for daily home reading. If you struggle for time, we understand and encourage your child to write the title of the text themselves and get a quick signature from you. Any concerns please speak to your child's teacher.

### <u>Specialist</u>

## Middles

In the Middle School, we have a real focus on the values of St Mary MacKillop, which guide us in all aspects of our daily lives;

"NEVER SEE A NEED WITHOUT DOING SOMETHING ABOUT IT"

### Inquiry:

We continue investigating the 7 Man Made Wonders of the World and 7 Natural Wonders of the World. Students are engaged in researching specific information such as; When was it built? How was it formed? How old is it? Why was it built? What is the purpose? Where is it located? Students are also given the opportunity to investigate their own wonderings and curiosity!

At times, we linked nicely the work we are doing in Inquiry in Maths. This was very evident in working through measurements and distances of Mt Everest and The Great Wall of China. Students enjoyed making estimates, converting measurements and making comparisons.

### Sounds-Write

The children are given a small weekly homework activity on Monday and we would appreciate it if it could be returned on Thursday.

An important part of the Sounds Write program is for the students to be read to, by an adult. Students are given specific books to take home;

**Book One;** "Decodable Text" which is for the student to read, as it contains the sounds they have worked on and are currently doing.

**Book Two;** A text is for an adult to read to the students, as this book contains rich vocabulary and opportunities for discussion. This is a more challenging text and is beyond what the student is capable or expected to read.

## **Mathematics**

Our continued focus is multiplication.

Fact recall and effective mental strategies are so important in multiplication!

It is an area that is filtered through many other concepts (measurement, statistics, money) that solid knowledge and understanding is considered a life skill!

Students have been working very hard on representing multiplication through; arrays, groups and pictures. Our maths hour is a very structured routine to ensure the best learning opportunities are available to our students. We differentiate our learning opportunities for students, so that we are providing them the best opportunity to grow.

Our whole group session begins with a retrieval and revision of core numeracy skills, strategies and knowledge. This concentrates on investigating numbers, patterns, counting, place value and naming and renaming, modelling and discussing numbers.

Our differentiated sessions begin with an explicit and specific explanation of the goal or purpose of the session. We then discuss how we can achieve this and what are the steps or mini goals to achieve.

The main part of the session is focused on either explicit teacher-led instruction for new or newish concepts, or if the concept has been consolidated, then the learning opportunities are focused on expanding and applying student knowledge of that concept.

Small group work is a significant part of the learning experience and this is a wonderful time for peer learning.

Another important aspect of the learning experience is using concrete materials to assist learning. We use dice, MAB Blocks, mini whiteboards, counters, etc.

The last part of the session is coming together again as a whole group to share and reflect.

## **Literacy**

What if one day you turned into a giant??

This has been the stimulus for our writing this term!

Spend time discussing with your child this prompt and discover the wonderfully creative ideas and storylines, characters and settings they have explored and developed!

Word investigation and vocabulary building is a very important part of reading and an essential skill to be an effective reader. Each day we spend time on "word work", which focuses on sounds / spelling correspondences, as well as our dedicated Morphology hour on a Tuesday. This focuses on word building, tense and sentences.

This gives students the tools to write more interesting, descriptive, informative and persuasive texts.

Students really enjoy brainstorming, investigating, spelling and using in context the words we are finding out about.





Students should read for 15 - 20 minutes each night to develop confidence, accuracy, fluency, expression and use of reading and literacy strategies. Reading with and to your child is a great way to build vocabulary and develop their comprehension. Discussing the texts, characters, settings, as well as making predictions and sharing ideas are great places to start!

A parent / carer signature is required each night, as returning Student Diaries each morning to the teacher is an important part of the morning routine, as well as monitoring student progress.

In Reading we have been reading about strange and weird world-records, working hard on developing our vocabulary, breaking words into syllables and building our comprehension skills.

In Writing, we are beginning to prepare for our Lion's Public Speaking competition. The 2023 topic being: Strange World Records set in History. We have begun our research of different records and will soon start creating our speeches, putting ourselves in the role of the record-breaker. We expect to be holding our school-based event in Week 9 of Term 2, from which our finalists will go to the next stage. In Spelling, we have been continuing our focus on Morphology and the Suffixing Conventions.

### Numeracy

We have wrapped up our Multiplication and Division unit and have now moved onto investigating Shape and Area and Data Representations. Next week, our Maths Olympiad crew will be taking part in their second test. We wish them a lot of luck and hope their equations are correct!

### <u>Inquiry</u>

### All Around the World!

Our focus this term has been Geography, and we have been inquiring about another country around the world. We have written an information report, created a tourist attraction brochure, a passport stamp and slide-show all about our chosen country. Next week, we will be creating dioramas of a natural / man-made formation of our country. We remind students that they need to bring their resources from home in advance to prepare for our construction days.

We will be displaying all of our hard work and inquiry projects at our Travel Expo. We are happy to be able to invite all parents/guardians to our Expo, to show off our learning on <u>Wednesday 21st June</u> between <u>12:00pm and 1:30pm</u>.

## Getting started with parental controls in social media, games and apps



Many social media sites, games and apps now come with parental controls. The eSafety Guide has advice on safety features that can be useful for parents and carers, including how to use the settings to protect personal information and report online abuse.

Here are some examples of the parental control features included in popular social media, games and apps.

### Roblox

Roblox is a game creation platform that allows users to design games, play together and chat. Using built-in parental controls, parents can manage the way their children use the game. These features include a 'restricted' mode that prevents access to chat and inappropriate games.

### TikTok

TikTok is a social media app for creating and sharing short videos. TikTok has a feature called Family Pairing that allows parents to link their Tik Tok account to their teen's account. Family pairing lets parents set controls like how much time their child spends on TikTok, the content they can see and their privacy settings.

### YouTube Kids

YouTube Kids is a filtered version of YouTube. Parents can create a separate profile for each child in their household. YouTube Kids uses a mix of automated filters, human review and parent feedback to limit the content that kids can see on the platform. Parents can also manually approve videos for their kids to watch, block videos and set screen time limits.


### **Facebook Messenger for Kids**

Messenger Kids is a free video calling and messaging app owned by Facebook. Parents can monitor their child's activity and control their contact list using a Parent Dashboard. Parents can sign up on behalf of their child, and it doesn't require the child to have Facebook account. Messenger Kids does not show advertising or offer in-app purchases.
