Last Friday, our Senior Students visited the Catholic Cathedral in Bendigo, particularly the statue of St Mary of the Cross MacKillop. The statue was commissioned in 2010 to celebrate the Canonisation of Mary MacKillop, as Australia's first and only Saint. Mary and her Josephite Sisters hold a very special place in our History and our Hearts as she opened our school in 1890, being the first Josephite School in Victoria.

What makes this statue even more significant and forever connected to the community of St Joseph's is the photo etched into the back of it. The photo captures the class of 1924 taken outside rooms 5 and 6. Some things haven't changed!

Preps


Congratulations to everyone for making it through Term 2. It has been a huge term! We can see the children are all looking forward to having 2 weeks' holiday.

Literacy

In Literacy this term the children have worked hard to participate in our Sounds Write program. They have practiced decoding words and writing sentences. We are so proud of how far the children have come and how much they have learnt. In the holidays we encourage the children to continue daily reading. We are sending home a booklet with sounds the children have been working on. The children can work through the booklet at their own pace.









Numeracy

Last week in Numeracy we were looking at collecting data and representing data on a simple graph. This was a fun topic and the children enjoyed exploring and answering different questions.


After the show we went to the park again to eat our lunch. When we finished eating, we played on the playground.

Numeracy

Our daily warmups in Numeracy focus on essential counting and place value skills. Students are getting more confident to take chances with skip counting patterns and identifying the value of digits within numbers.

The last few weeks have seen us measuring in lots of ways, both formally and informally. This topic has been a lot of fun with estimation and inquiry into hefting, length, and capacity.

Mrs Arnel has caused a lot of controversy with the question: What weighs more 1tonne of feathers or 1tonne of bricks. Who can you trick with this?

Homework (Routine continues)

Phonics A reminder that children have a phonics book with weekly focus words for children to practice at home. We encourage children to write these words at least twice a week.

Reading Logs We ask that all students please read to an adult every night. Once completed please write the title and a small comment in their reader diary.

Ideas for reading at home together - before reading, predict the story, look through the illustrations using the language in the book, stop half way and share what you think might happen next, check your predictions at the end. Finally ask your child to retell the story checking comprehension.

This year our Reading Logs have daily questions related to The Resilience Project. We love reading little notes left around the Daily GEM chat topic.

Some of our students are loving the Reward system tracking for the number of nights reading.



Our Literacy block has been action-packed, with our dynamic Sounds-Write groups continuing to build their phonics knowledge and responding to the text 'Danny, Champion of The World.' Students have deeply engaged in creating interesting narratives using the writing process and studying different fairytales. Our term culminates with the Junior Public Speaking Competition, hosted by the Numurkah Rotary Club. Students will deliver their speeches during Week 11, with the Grand Final on Thursday, June 27th. A few lucky students will be chosen to represent the school on stage in Term 3.

Our students have truly enjoyed challenging themselves through our Numeracy Groups, where they are tested before every unit to ensure they are engaged every lesson. This term, we have covered multiplication and division, time, length and area, and addition and subtraction. Students have loved moving their Maths









Throughout our Term 2 inquiry unit on Australian History, students worked hard to develop their research skills. We enjoyed a virtual excursion to the Australian War Memorial in Canberra and researched information about genuine World War 1 and World War 2 artifacts. Our term will come to a crescendo with our Inquiry Project Expo, which will take place in your child's classroom on Friday morning.

Students have also been busy learning about the 7 Sacraments of the Church. It will be a very special time for those students undergoing the sacrament of Reconciliation, in preparation for their First Communion in Term 3.

Literacy

Inquiry

From weeks 8 to 11, we began exploring everything gold. The history of the Gold Rush is interesting as it took place quite close to our local area. The Seniors had the opportunity to travel to Bendigo, explore the goldfields, and head down into the mines. The Seniors learnt loads of information about the conditions, machines, and tools the miners had endured and used during that time. It was a great excursion that all the students enjoyed.

The students have done a fantastic job participating in our winter sports program. This has recently involved playing Nathalia, Strathmerton and St Joseph's Cobram. In typical fashion, our students proudly represented the school and played with determination and spirit. Both the football and netball teams experienced some great wins. VACATION CARE


